

PUBLIC WORKS SNOW REMOVAL

The Public Works Department salts and plows the village streets, village ordnance states **No parking on village streets after 2" snow or till completely removed**. As plows clear the streets, they push the snow toward the curb. Inevitably, the snow will be pushed in front of driveway entrance. Unfortunately, there is no way to avoid this. Each resident must assume responsibility for clearing enough of this snow to allow them to get in and out of there driveway, **without putting it back into the village street**. **VIOLATORS WILL BE TICKETED**

Residents who are incapable of removing this snow themselves or who do not care to do so may choose to hire a teen or plow service to assist them.

The highest priority of the Public Works plow drivers must be to make the streets as safe as possible for vehicle traffic and for the passage of emergency vehicles in the event they need to get to your home.

There are 32 center lane miles of street, in Sauk Village that the plows must keep clear and salted. While we regret any inconvenience we trust you will understand. As a side note the salt supplies this year seem to be stable but the cost is still up ,so purchasing will be slow due to the economic times. When traveling give your self plenty of time and be courteous to others. Be safe and happy holidays from the Public Works Dept.

Fire Department News



We at the Sauk Village Fire Department sincerely hope that you had a safe and pleasant holiday season. Now that we're in to the New Year, and a new decade, it's a time for reflection as well as looking ahead to the future. Looking back over emergency call responses for the last several years, here's a Top 10 list of things that will get you in trouble, hurt, or burn down your house. We know this because it has happened!

- 1. Fires caused by space heaters- keep space heaters at least three feet from walls or furniture.
- 2. Candles- never leave lit candles unattended. When you go out- BLOW OUT.
- 3. Fireplace owners- get your chimney's inspected and/or cleaned annually.
- 4. If you have an attached garage, do not warm your cars up inside the garage on cold days. Even with the garage door up, the carbon monoxide will get in your house.
- 5. Bathroom ceiling vent fans need to be vacuumed out occasionally or they will eventually cause a fire.
- 6. Empty out your clothes dryer lint trap with every load. Boy scouts use lint to start campfires- it only takes one or two little sparks to ignite and static electricity is a spark.
- 7. Do not transport gas cans in the passenger compartment of your vehicle... especially while smoking.
- 8. Open burning (leaves, garbage, scrap wood) is NOT allowed in Cook County UNLESS you have one of those nice store bought backyard fire pits with the lid on it.
- 9. Fireworks are not only illegal in IL, but they will burn down your house as well as your neighbor's house. Nobody wins a bottle rocket war.
- 10. And finally (drum roll please)... while driving, these are five locations where you want to be on your toes paying close attention.

The five most common places for vehicle accidents are (in order of frequency) 1) the Sauk Trail "S" curves particularly the first curve just west of the Moose Lodge. Just a little rain and for some reason this curve becomes an ice skating rink. And there's Burnham Ave on the east end of the curves- lot's of traffic; 2) Torrence Ave and Steger Rdthere is a blind spot in that little valley on Steger Rd just east of Torrence. If you're turning on to Steger Rd, wait a couple seconds to see if a car comes flying out of that valley; 3) Burnham Ave at Steger Rd- little hills and trees mean you have to pull out from Burnham to see traffic on Steger Rd. Don't pull out too far; 4) Sauk Trail at 394. This intersec-

tion is not the place to try beating that yellow light; and 5) Torrence Ave at Rt. 30- not sure what the problem is, but we get crashes here pretty frequently.

There you have it- these "top ten" represent some of the most frequent calls, and in some cases, not the most frequent, but perhaps some of the most severe calls that the Sauk Village Fire Department has been on in the last ten years. This list is by no means all inclusive. Thinking back, it is amazing some of the predicaments that people get themselves into that require fire department intervention. But that's ok!! That's why we're here.

So looking ahead to the future, January will see the delivery of a new fire engine. This engine will replace our 1989 open cab providing a safer ride for firefighters and a more reliable fire response for you. That will leave just one last white fire engine which will be moved over to the reserve spot.

Also looking ahead to the future, what are YOU doing for your community? Make this the year that you step out and do something positive for Sauk Village. You can be a role model for younger generations and be that knight in shining armor when somebody's having a bad day. The Sauk Village Fire Department is always accepting applications for new firefighters. The pay isn't much, but we don't do this for the pay- we do because we love it. If you are at least 18 years old, a Sauk Village resident, have a high school diploma, and can pass a background check and physical, come to the Sauk Village Fire Department to get an application and to schedule an interview. This could be the start of a new adventure!

The mission of the Public Works Department is fourfold;

- 1) To Provide for the proper maintenance, care and 3) operation of all public facilities, infrastructure and equipment. This is accomplished through the scheduled maintenance or the timely and cost 4) effective repair of the structural, mechanical, electrical and plumbing systems of all publicly owned buildings.
 - Village owned parks, recreation facilities and open green spaces are also maintained.
- 2) To ensure the safety and convenience of the municipal roadway system. Responsibilities include maintenance and repairs to the storm sewer system to insure proper drainage of all storm water run-off, snow and ice control, street patching and repair, curb and sidewalk repair, tree trimming, pavement marking, traffic control sign installation and maintenance, street lighting, parkway restoration and branch and debris pick up.

- 4) To assist the Water Department in maintenance and up grades to the water system. (excluding treatment)

Fire Department News



The first couple of weeks in April were pretty rough, not just for the Sauk Village Fire Department, but for our Fire Service community in general. On Tuesday, March 30, the Homewood Fire Department responded to residential fire with reports of a trapped person. Long story short, things turned bad really quick as Firefighters Brian Carey and Karra Kopas were in the house attempting to find the paralyzed resident. Firefighter Kopas was able to get out suffering severe burn injuries. Firefighter Carey and the resident did not make it out alive.

Brian Carey was the first Line of Duty death in the Homewood Fire Department's 109 year history. He gave his life doing what we are all sworn to do. Brian's wake and funeral were held in Oak Lawn and Evergreen Park. The services were attended by over 2500 firefighters from all over Illinois and beyond- a suitable farewell for a fallen brother.

The exact cause of the inferno has not yet been officially disclosed and may not be for some time as federal a safe and pleasant summer! investigators wrap up their business and finalize their reports. One speculated cause for the rapid growth of fire conditions was the apparent oxygen bottles that were stored in the house. This possibility was fueled by media coverage and has even spawned an "oxygen awareness" Facebook page. The final reports are being anxiously awaited.

Whether the oxygen tanks stored in this house were at fault or not, gas cylinders (oxygen or otherwise) are extremely dangerous under fire conditions. I myself had a humbling experience several years ago when I discovered an oxygen and acetylene tank for welding in a garage next to the burning electrical outlet/wall that we had just extinguished.

The Sauk Village Fire Department is currently working with the Sauk Village Public Relations committee to develop a way for people to easily notify or register with the Fire Department if you have oxygen, welding equipment, or any other flammable gas cylinders in your home or garage. In the meantime, PLEASE feel free to call the Fire Department at 708-758-2225 to let us know if you have any gas cylinders in your home. This information will aid us in developing a database that can be checked prior to going in a burning structure.

On a lighter note, enjoy this nicer weather and have a safe and pleasant summer!



Summer Home Security Tips

Most of the over two million home break-ins every year (one every 15 seconds) happen in July and August, when vacationing families leave their houses empty and vulnerable. Summer travel season has arrived, so before you hit the road, make sure to take simple steps to keep criminals out of your home.

No one wants to come home from a relaxing vacation to broken windows and stolen valuables, but in the rush to leave, people often forget to secure their houses. You can rest easy and enjoy your vacation with these smart, simple and affordable ways to keep your home safe.

* Make your home look lived in

Ask a friendly neighbor to make sure the lawn is mowed and keep an eye out for unusual activity around your house. Suspend newspaper and mail delivery or have someone collect them for you and make sure the trash cans are put out and brought in on time. The more lived-in your home appears to be, the less inviting it is to thieves.

* Leave a light on

Put a few lights and a radio on timers set to go on and off at random times during the day and evening. Leaving one light on the entire time you're away is an obvious sign that no one is around to turn it off. Close most of your window shades, but keep a few open on upper floors for light to shine through and make it look like someone is home. Install motion detector lights by each entry to your home, including the garage. Thieves don't want to be in the spotlight!

* Don't invite a climber

Don't leave toys or ladders around your yard, they can easily be used to stand on or climb up to break into your home. Likewise, prune back any tall trees with branches near upper windows.

* Lock it up

It sounds obvious, but lock the doors and windows - more than 50 percent of thieves burglarize homes by walking right in. Use deadbolt locks that can only be opened with a key and forget about hiding the key under a doormat. If you must keep a key nearby, purchase a steel lockbox with a combination that is specifically made to store keys.

* Sound the alarm


A survey by Temple University found that alarm systems, when used with other precautions; reduce the likelihood of burglary by more than 60 percent.

* Don't squirrel valuables away

Thieves aren't dumb; they know people like to stash their goods under the bed, between the pages of books and in the sock drawer. Store your valuables in a safe-deposit box at the bank or in a safe you can bolt to the floor.

The last thing worthy of mention is not necessarily seasonal- the Sauk Village Fire Department in the last year has responded to a significant number of fires and potential fires that started with bathroom ceiling fans. If you have an older model fan, you may want to consider having it replaced by a qualified electrician. Don't take your bathroom fans for granted. They do need to be cleaned and maintained.

The Sauk Village Fire Department is very much concerned for the safety and well-being of our citizens. If

This year we have an overwhelming amount of residents that are not maintaining their lawns. Please be advised the ordinance states grass/weeds can not be over 8" in height. That includes weeds growing in fences and around the general vicinity. We strictly enforce this & have issued several hundred tickets. When cutting your grass please do not cut it into the street, when it rains it washes down to the sewers and the sewers become clogged which causes flooding on the street.

Parking on a non hard surface is against the Village ordinance. Please make sure you park on concrete or asphalt.

Residents cannot sell candy or any other food items from their home. This is becoming a big problem & it is prohibited.

All pools must have a fence around them whether it's a kiddie pool or a full size pool. This is for the safety of the children. Also, if a pool has a filter system it can not be plugged into an extension cord, it has to have its own GFI outlet. With extension cords you run the risk of getting an electrical shock. Pools need permits.

Garbage can placement must be to the rear of the property. It's unsightly to have garbage stored in the front of your house overflowing with lids that can't be shut.

Please be reminded Building Permits are required for most work being done to the home. Please call the Building Department if you have any questions.

If you experience graffiti on your property there is a program available through the Cook County Sheriff's Department. The phone number is (773) 869-4710. They will give you instructions on what needs to be done for removal.

News from the Village Clerk

Ever since the introduction of early voting, voters can cast their ballots as early as 22 days before Election Day. This requires election administrators to have ballots prepared more than a month earlier than before.

Starting with the **2011 elections**, Public Act 96-1008 extends the election calendar, making deadlines earlier. Now, petitions must be filed a number of weeks earlier, providing adequate time for ballot preparation and electoral board proceedings.

For those of you who are seeking local elected offices - it means your filing dates will come a few weeks earlier than before.

For the April 5, 2011 Consolidated Election, the new deadline is 106 days before the election, which is five weeks earlier than it was. This will affect just about all non-city offices. The filing period will run from December 13th to Dec 20th of this year. Circulation of nomination papers can start September 21, 2010.

Please note that the State Board has not yet published its official calendar for next year, so the dates relating to the 2011 elections must be regarded as tentative.

The 2011 Candidate's Guide is provided by the Illinois State Board of Elections and will be available on line at www.elections.state.il.us.

I would like to thank everyone that has completed their property maintenance. We encourage everyone to participate, it enhances the overall appearance of the community. For any resident that received a property maintenance letter time is running out for the work to be completed.

With fall approaching we recommend you have your furnace cleaned and certified by a licensed heating contractor.

If you have a wood burning fireplace you should have a chimney sweep clean and inspect your fireplace. Storage of wood for fireplaces should be elevated not less than 12" above ground with a clear space underneath to prevent harborage of rats and other animals. All wood is required to be stored only in the rear yard.


Make sure your smoke/co detectors are functioning properly. Don't forget to change the battery.

If you own a pool make sure it has a proper pool cover on it. All pools that are not in use have to be winterized and covered. All quick set (temporary) and inflatable pools have to be removed during the fall/through winter months.

Please store garbage/containers to the rear of the property. It's unsightly to have garbage—over-flowing in front of houses; it creates a nuisance for surrounding neighbors that have to pick up trash that is blowing into their yards and into the streets. Garbage is not to be placed out on the parkway until after 6:00p.m the night before your—pick-up.

Please be advised there is no parking on a non-hard surface – all vehicles have to be parked on concrete or asphalt.

During the week of August 9, the Sauk Village Fire Department hosted our second annual Junior Fire Academy. The "summer camp" style event was held for kids aged 5 to 11 and ran for three hours a day. There were 32 kids in this year's Academy representing eight communities: Sauk Village, Steger, Crete, South Chicago Heights, and Beecher, as well as Dyer, Munster, and Highland, IN.

During the course of the week, the kids were taught valuable lessons in fire prevention, what to do if there is a fire in your house, how to call 911 and what to say, and why and how firefighters do what they do. The kids were divided into teams, each with a team name corresponding with a fire department function- rescue squad, engine company, and truck company. Station activities included opportunities to do things that firefighters working on a squad, engine, or truck would do. For example, a squad company focuses on rescue. The kids got to crawl through a maze to find and rescue a baby (doll). The engine company is all about putting water on the fire. An entire day was dedicated to playing games with fire hoses ensuring that everybody, including the helpers were good and soaked.

On the last day of the Academy, parents and family were invited to come back to the fire station a little earlier for a graduation ceremony. At that time three special Academy participants were recognized. About five years ago, Brandon Beddigs (now 10) discovered that his grandmother's oven was on fire. Brandon calmly went to his grandmother in the basement of her unincorporated Chicago Heights home and told her about the fire. Brandon then calmly got his coat and went outside. He told Sauk Village Fire Department firefighters that he learned what to do from the firemen that came to his school. At the time, Brandon was honored with a plaque and FD t-shirt at a Village Board meeting.

In April of this year, I received a letter from the grandparents of Kaitlyn Foutz (age 8). Kaitlyn was at their house when a lamp caught fire. Kaitlyn calmly went outside and stood on the sidewalk, not worrying about getting a coat or shoes despite the chilly weather. Kaitlyn, when asked, likewise said she learned what to do from the firemen that came to her school. Through a series of connections, two paid on call members of the Sauk Village Fire Department were asked to work at a private school in Highland, IN as fire watch while their fire alarm

system was being overhauled early last year. That led to an invitation to come do a fire prevention presentation for the kids, one of whom was Kaitlyn.

And finally, Tabbitha Myers was recognized at a Village Board meeting earlier this year for her efforts in noticing that her neighbor's house was on fire. At first she wasn't sure what she was seeing, so 12 year old Tabbi, went and got her mother, New Lenox 911 Dispatcher Kandi Myers, who confirmed that they were seeing fire in a bedroom window. Together, their quick actions led to a quick fire department response, keeping the fire contained to a bedroom. Tabbi has worked as a team helper for the Junior Fire Academy and her dad and grandfather are Paul and Ed Myers (respectively) of the Sauk Village Fire Department.

After recognizing these special guests, Academy graduates were presented with certificates, group portraits, and a very nice chicken lunch courtesy of Popeyes- which reminds me. The Junior Fire Academy would not be possible with out support and donations from so many. All the team leaders and helpers are strictly volunteer. Many local and not so local businesses also made contributions- Behr Paint Corporation, The Oakwood Group, Ray and Wally's Towing, Rich Construction, and Walt's Foods to name just a few.

So, the 2010 Junior Fire Academy was a huge success to say the least. Plans are already in the works for the 2011 Academy. If you're on Facebook, look up the Sauk Village Fire Department. There you will find the 2010 Junior Fire Academy photo album as well as other news and information about us.

It is no secret that the global economy is just emerging from the most severe recession since the early 1930s. Some of the effects of the recession have been a severe downturn in regional economic activity occasioned by massive job losses. Needless to say, this has imposed severe hardships and untold suffering on our community. It is however not all doom and gloom. The dreaded spectrum of a depression, evidenced on the ground suggests that the global economy, including Sauk Village, is slowly moving back into positive economic territory.

Let me briefly share with you some of the key assumptions that support the budget being presented today. The municipal fiscal environment is influenced by a variety of macro economic conditions. The slow economy has an impact on the ability of customers to pay their bills and in turn the revenue to be collected is affected. These factors have been considered in the preparation of the Budget.

This year, the Village presents a Proposed Estimated total budget of \$18,783,013.00 for the 2010/11 financial year, a Proposed Estimated operating budget of \$17,873,860.00.

The operating budget outlines the activities, services and functions carried out within the Village. Each Department's budget is characterized by program activities and includes both financial and personnel resources necessary to carry out the functions as outlined in the Proposed Estimated Budget. Preparing this budget has not been an easy task, the past 18 months presented financial challenges to the Village as a result of the global economic meltdown. Mindful of the soon to come slow economic recovery, the Village developed a financial strategy to ease the financial pressures. The strategy aims at maximization of revenue and curtailing of expenditure.

These challenges include increasing demand for services with limited financial resources. When putting this budget together, the easy thing would have been to use the financial challenges as an excuse to stop doing some services. However, the Village of Sauk will ensure that service delivery is maintained and at the same time ensuring that the Village is financially sustainable.

The Village proposes to adopt the 2010/11 operating budget.

The projected revenue for the 2010/11 is approximately \$18,783,013.00 (Eighteen Million Seven Hundred and Eighty Three Thousand and Thirteen dollars), the major sources of funding are; Taxes totaling (\$5,972,274.00), Special Revenue, totaling (\$1,235,612.00) Capitol Projects totaling (\$3,832,763.00), Debt Service, (\$3,685,224.00), Enterprise (\$3,762,500) and Fiduciary being (\$294,700.00).

Sauk Village will continue to strive toward higher quality of service delivery. I think you will agree with me when I say that the roadmap is clear. This budget is in line with our vision and the commitments that we have made to the citizens of Sauk Village.

We have demonstrated that the path to the attainment of a World Class Village for all remains within reach. Residents, please let me reiterate that Sauk Village is more than ready to Grow!

through 14. To ensure that all residents have a chance to participate all leaves must be raked down to the curb and placed in the street, no piles will be raked from yards there will be no exception. Due to the layoffs and the possible emergencies that could arise this is the only way to assure each section is gone through. The goal of this program is to clear all leaf debris from the streets to save on overtime due to clogged storm grates and possible flooding. This will also help in property maintenance to keep the town looking clean and lessen incapable of removing this snow themselves or who do the debris going into the waterways which will only affect the future condition of all the water we drink. If you have more leaf debris after we have been through each section you should collect and place in yard bags with a sticker to be picked by skyline disposal .After the collection dates are completed no leaf debris will be allowed to be raked into the street Tickets will be

issued. Village Ordinance prohibits parking on the streets between the hours of 7:00 A.M. and 3:30 P.M. during the day of your garbage pickup.

The Public Works Department salts and plows the The leaf pickup program will begin November 1, village streets. Village ordnance states No parking on village streets after 2" of snow or till completely

removed. As plows clear the streets they push the snow toward the curb, inevitably the snow will be pushed in front of driveway entrances, unfortunately there is no way to avoid this. Each resident must assume responsibility for clearing enough of this snow to allow them to get in and out of there driveway without

putting it back into the village streets. VI-**OLATORS CAN BE TICKETED!** Residents who are not care to do so may choose to hire a teen or plow service to assist them. The highest priority of the Public Works plow drivers must be to make the streets as safe as possible for residents to come and go and for the passage of emergency vehicles in the event they need to get to your home. There are 27 center lane miles of street and six village facilities that the plows must keep clear and salted. Due to the layoffs and safety concerns we will work to this goal. Fire Prevention Week 2010 was a success once again thanks to the hard work of Acting Lieutenant Paul Myers and the firefighters that jumped in to help out. There were multiple assemblies at Wagoner, Strassburg, and Rickover schools and for the second year in a row, in lieu of an open house at the fire station, the Sauk Village Fire Department partnered with the Sauk Village McDonalds for a fun afternoon in their parking lot. Kid's were able to meet Sparky the fire dog, tour fire department vehicles, and get educational (but fun) fire prevention materials. Just as important, for coming to visit the firefighters, kids were treated with free ice cream and fries!

By the time you're reading this, you've probably already changed your clocks for Daylight Savings Time. CHANGE YOUR CLOCK- CHANGE YOUR BATTERY. Those are words of wisdom that will never get old. Your smoke or carbon monoxide detectors may very well save your life some day- don't take them for granted. It's not just about the batteries either. Smoke and CO detectors do have a life span. They're typically only good for about five years. Check the back of the detector, there might be a date on it. Also on the back of the detector will be a guide on what the few different warning signals mean. A single "beep" every thirty seconds is a low battery alarm- NOT a carbon monoxide warning. When in doubt, call 911, but keep in mind a couple things- the fire department cannot for financial reasons provide batteries or detectors. That would be nice, but we don't get them

for free either.

As the weather changes and we settle back into winter mode, please keep in mind these few common cold weather fire and health hazards:

- If you use a space heater, keep the heater AT LEAST 3 feet away from anything- furniture, walls, piles of clothes, etc.
- If you use a fire place, make sure the chimney is clean. Don't warm your car up in an attached garage. Even with the garage door open, if the wind is right, all that exhaust full of carbon monoxide is coming in your house.

Specific hazards related to the holidays:

- Electrical cords- use a power strip with a circuit breaker to power all those holiday lights.
- Avoid running extension cords in traffic areas where they can get damaged.
- Keep your tree watered and fresh.

Don't leave lit candles unattended- if you go out, blow out.

With that said, on behalf of the men and women of the Sauk Village Fire Department, we wish you all a happy, joyous, and SAFE holiday season.



Winter tips from ESDA

It's that time of year to prepare for the upcoming winter months. We need to prepare ourselves by making sure our vehicles are ready for the roads. We must always be aware of wet and icy roads. To help make your holidays safe and enjoyable, please prepare yourself by following a few good practices. Dress warm for the weather. Also keep a blanket, ice scraper, gloves, hat and jumper cables in your trunk for any trip you make during the winter months. Make sure you check all fluids in your vehicle before leaving on a trip. Always make sure you have at least a half tank of fuel during the winter months. Be aware of your surroundings. Keep your eyes open for any animals crossing the road. Please also allow more space between you and the vehicle in front of you and slow down when you come upon an accident while emergency personnel are helping the injured.
